Inmate Andrus is a well-established career felon, and should not be paroled. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of fear and violence to the community.

Inmate Andrus was first convicted of residential burglary in Santa Barbara in 1986 and was sentenced to 4 years in prison. He was released from prison and committed another residential burglary. He was sentenced to 12 years in prison for that offense. Inmate Andrus has made a career out of breaking into victims' homes. After these two residential burglary offenses, he was convicted for possession of methamphetamine. He was released from prison and went right back to his chosen profession of residential burglar. In 2001 he pled to all charges stemming from a residential burglary and faced a sentence of 37 years to life in State Prison. The court gave Inmate Andrus a break and reduced his sentence to 24 years in prison. Inmate Andrus should not receive additional reprieve from his deserved sentence.

Not only has Inmate Andrus been a menace to the community in the short periods of time that he has been free, he also is far from a model prisoner. As recently as 2013, Inmate Andrus was convicted of a violation of Penal Code Section 4573.6 for bringing drugs into prison. He received a 2-year consecutive sentence for that offense. Inmate Andrus has a long history of non-compliance with the rules and regulations of the prison system: 2/2/06 for possession of marijuana; 4/7/06 for using a phone; 7/4/09 for fighting; 3/22/11 for using another's ID and 10/18/12 for possession of marijuana. Inmate Andrus has not attempted to change his behavior in the community or in prison. Releasing this inmate will give him yet another opportunity to cause law-abiding citizens to live in fear knowing that the sanctity of their home has been violated by this career criminal.

From the record that is available, Inmate Andrus should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied.
