Re: Fickenworth, Garrison CDC # AY8638 Court Docket: 15F04462

Inmate Fickenworth is a well-established violent felon, and should not be paroled. The circumstances surrounding his current conviction and his prior criminal record show that he poses an unreasonable risk of violence to the community.

The Inmate is currently in prison for stealing another car. This time, he was stopped by law enforcement for a vehicle code violation. Law enforcement soon found out that the vehicle was stolen. It had a stripped ignition and was being driven with a screwdriver. The Inmate had also switched the plates on the vehicle. During the criminal trial, the Inmate took the stand. The jury did not believe his story about how he obtained the vehicle. They also heard about some of his five prior stolen vehicle convictions.

When this crime was committed, the Inmate was on parole. This would not be the first time he violated his parole. The Inmate has an additional parole violation earlier in 2015 as well as 2006, 2005, 2004 **Constant**. The Inmate has been in and out of prison since his violent Robbery strike offense in 2002. Since 2002, the Inmate has not been out of custody for a single year. He continues to commit new crimes or violate some sort of supervision. This is now his eighth trip to prison.

The Inmate is a danger to the community. Not only does he have a violent criminal history that sent him to prison. But he also continues to commit new crimes. The committing offense was done while on parole showing that the only way to keep him from committing new crimes is to remain in prison. Inmate Fickenworth was 38 years old when he committed his most recent offense and has been sentenced to prison for approximately half of his life because he continues to commit crimes when not in custody.

In this Board's previous denial letter dated October 6, 2020, it is noted that Inmate Fickenworth has sustained 7 serious violations during his term. Six of those violations involve assaultive behavior.

Further, in the

Board's denial they state, "When balancing the aggravating circumstances against the mitigating circumstances, they tend to show that the inmate's institutional behavior, work history, and rehabilitative programming aggravate the inmate's current risk of violence or significant criminal activity because of numerous RVRs." From the record that is available it is clear that Inmate Fickenworth should not be released as he poses a significant, unreasonable risk of violence to the community. Parole should be denied.
